Dear Brothers, Colleagues and Friends

Fear not, fellow teacher. Your job looks to be secure.

Yours, along with those at least of doctors, nurses, IT geeks, and creative entrepreneurs. Or so it is predicted. But people in the rest of the workforce, apparently, have reason to be a tad nervous. They could soon be going the way of lamp-lighters, wheelwrights, chimneysweeps, and compilers of logarithm tables. Won't be needed any more. New technologies, globalisation, brave new world. Redundancy cheques to be electronically transferred imminently.

Predictions about the future of work have been around for years. We speak to our students about them, tell them that they're likely to have several major career changes, and that these will involve jobs that don't yet exist. We advise them not to pin all their hopes on the acquisition of a narrow set of skills. We warn them about the seismic shifts that are occurring in just about everything because of the digital revolution and the shrinking of the global village. We hope that they take heed, even if their normal planning window doesn't go much past the end of the week.

The latest contribution to this discussion has been offered by the Foundation for Young People – a fairly groovy bunch, going by their website. 'The New Work Order' their report is ambitiously called – 'Ensuring young Australians have skills and experience for the jobs of the future, not the past'. It makes for an interesting enough read, all good stuff but nothing that is likely to surprise any contemporary educator. Most schools are well alert to the imperative to nurture capacity in young people that allows them to engage their world in critical, analytical, collaborative, imaginative and proactive ways. Approaches such as Project-Based Learning – so effectively pioneered in Australia by Parramatta Marist High, and now taken up by others such as Marist College Bendigo – are among the ways that schools employ to do just that.

Outside the specific brief of the FYP report, but well within that of any Marist school, is the preparation of young people for the personal relationships and their broader engagement in the society and church of tomorrow. Just as we can't freeze in time today's jobs and workplaces, nor is it realistic to do so for church, society and family. The apparent givens and patterns that have served the past, may not be as relevant or useful in the future. But now we get into trickier territory.

All that said and accepted, there is, nonetheless, always a risk in exaggerating the scope and pace of change. For example, I suspect that the above list of five occupations that are predicted to survive our grandchildren is likely to be somewhat longer. Lawyers won't go without a fight; and I can think of a few other professions that seem to survive robustly through the vicissitudes of time. So, also, there are fundamentals of human living that will be as true tomorrow as today, as always: love is selfless and it is faithful; forgiveness is freeing; truth and trust underpin any relationship that is to endure; justice and service evangelise; hope gives birth to joy; the humble of heart know God.

Happily, there will be teachers of such Good News.



MARIST SOLIDARITY BOOSTS HEALTHCARE IN CAMBODIA



Students from Marcellin College Bulleen and Marist College Ashgrove that have volunteered for immersion experiences will be familiar with the Marists' rural health outreach project in the Cambodian province of Pailin, which has so far treated more than 1,400 patients—mostly women and children.

The project kicked off last November in response to local needs for basic medical services, which are otherwise unavailable because of inadequate transport, very poor roads, and a lack of money to buy medicines.

Clinics are now held each week in Pailin city and three more weekly clinics are held in the rural villages of Ou Chet Pram and Chaine. Adults and children are now being treated for a range of medical conditions, such as malnutrition and infectious diseases, including HIV/AIDS.

Training and healthcare education workshops are also being delivered to increase the capacity of local communities to sustain long-term health outcomes.

The project is a partnership between the Marist Brothers, healthcare workers in Pailin, international volunteers, the Cambodian Ministry of Health, and our Spanish funding partners Manos Unidas.

More support is needed to ensure that local communities benefit from this project in the long-term.
