Dear Colleagues,

I recall a parent forum conducted when a student in Year 12. The Principal asked us, and our parents, to gather to discuss concerns about our year group's propensity to socialise most weekends at the expense of sleep and study. After 15 minutes of outlining some of the behaviours that had raised concerns, such as sleeping in class on Mondays and large numbers of overdue or sloppily completed assignments, a father stood to comment from the floor. As he was a leading Sydney Silk, the room went expectantly quiet. The respected legal man launched a most compelling case for the boys to leave the partying for a few more years until we had our school and further education complete. Murmurs of assent from adults throughout the room grew to cries of "hear hear" and "too right!". The Principal was beaming - the students were hearing it from school and parents - the forum was a masterstroke! As the Silk resumed his chair to thunderous parent applause, suddenly the room fell silent. The Silk's son, who had been seated next to him, stood and waited to address the gathering. He commenced by politely stating his strong opposition to the case made by his esteemed father. The essence of the son's argument was that \$1 spent at the age of 17 or 18 bought a person exponentially more enjoyment than \$1 spent when they were 30, 40, or 50 years old. He posited it was good sense and economically prudent for the boys to continue in our garrulous ways. As you can imagine the room erupted in cheering from the boys and restrained laughter from the parents and Principal. It is a memory I have carried into adulthood and middle age and reminds me of the great urge young people have to gather and celebrate. It is a reality recognised by successive Popes since John Paul II, especially in their ongoing support for World Youth Day and other Catholic Youth Festivals.

As the commencement of the Australian Catholic Church's Year of Youth fast approaches with the National Catholic Youth Festival to be held at Homebush in Sydney this term in early December, the phenomena of gathering large numbers of young people of faith, for prayer and worship, is one which continues to surprise. The rational side of the brain speaks loudly of the costs associated with participation overseas on World Youth Days, disruption to learning for students away from classes for extended periods of time, risk assessments in relation to supervision and accommodation, unreal expectations of engagement among young people whose families do not practice Catholicism in traditional ways, or a lurking suspicion that for most students, their interest is tied to possibilities of a romantic nature! However despite seemingly rational and reasonable arguments against them, these gatherings hold enormous possibilities for faith development in young people. The voice of the Spirit is rarely rational.

Pope John Paul II started gathering young people from around the globe back in 1986 when he called the first World Youth Day to be celebrated in Saint Peter's Square on Palm Sunday. Young people from Australia have participated in increasing numbers ever since. Research conducted by a number of Catholic educators including Anthony Cleary from Sydney Catholic Schools and John Robinson from MSA, indicate evidence of the lasting and positive impact of such gatherings for young people and their accompanying teachers in the development of their Faith. In 1996, Pope John Paul II described the purpose of youth gatherings when he wrote:

"A Youth Day offers a young person a vivid experience of faith and communion, which will help to face the profound questions of life and to responsibly assume his or her place in society and in the ecclesial community. How can we not interpret their massive, willing and enthusiastic participation, as a constant demand to be accompanied on the pilgrimage of faith, on the journey which they undertake in response to God's grace working in their hearts? Listening to young people and teaching them, requires attention, time and wisdom. Youth ministry is one of the Church's priorities on the threshold of the third millennium.

The Marist story plays an important part in the Awaken Staff Spirituality program.



YEAR 11 MARIST FORUM

The annual Year 11 Marist Social Justice Forum proved to be another wonderful experience for all, but especially the students who were able to connect with the other students from Marist schools in Sydney and the ACT.

Held on the last weekend of Term 3, guest speakers helped to increase awareness of different social justice issues in contemporary Australian society. Speakers from CatholicCare highlighted the issue of Domestic Violence whilst Sr Noelene Simmons from Australian Catholic Religious Against the Trafficking of Humans (ACRATH) highlighted the modern slave trade industry, the problems of slavery in our supply chains of the clothes and mobile phones we buy. She emphasised the buying of Fairtrade products and the certified trademark that companies use to sell such items as chocolate! Students also took part in a simulation game called 'Basti Life'. 'Basti' means slum, and through 'playing' the game, students said, "Basti-life was enabled us to resonate with the hardships by communities in developing nations" and "Basti Life was really challenging because at first, I wanted to give up on the activity. But, after completing the activity I could understand (even just a little) the type of struggle that those in the slums experience every day".

Lastly, the Forum activity itself is always a winner as students get a chance to voice their concerns regarding 3 social issues that have been voted upon by themselves. Their passion was evident in the three issues chosen, which were mental health issues for males, racism (particularly against Indigenous people) and lastly, the gay marriage debate. A student said, "The Marist forum allowed me to hear different perspectives and we had a passionate conversation on important social issues. It has encouraged me to be more passionate at my school on my advocacy for social justice."

Looking at the student feedback and the way students engaged in the weekend long program, we have achieved our aim of providing a formative opportunity for your students to grow from and take away ideas to address social justice issues. Student Feedback regarding the Forum included the following:

"Interacting and accepting the views of individuals whom have differing beliefs to mine."

"Shown me that I can make a difference in the world and encourage others to work together to make the world a better and more just place"

"Allowed me to see a variety of ideas and opinions regarding issues and potential solutions".
