## From Brother Michael Green

Dear Brothers, Colleagues and Friends

If, like me, you have the working view that there hasn't been any decent music written since the 1980s, then you perhaps thank God for digital radio stations such as *Pure Gold 80s* and music streaming apps such as *Spotify*. All those great tunes live on. Wonderful for pumping through the house over the weekend.

Actually, I don't really hold that we have been suffering through a drought of decent music for the last three decades. But perhaps a person's length of years should allow some indulgence of nostalgia. At least, I presume so.

Some good music and lyrics go back way before the 80s. Even earlier than the 70s. Over these past weeks, almost all schools have been holding their commencement and commissioning liturgies and, more often than not as Marist communities, they have included in them the singing of the *Sub Tuum Præsidium*. Among our family of schools there are quite a few that have a custom of singing this ancient prayer congregationally and rather robustly, while others perform it with hauntingly lyrical majesty. Some lift the tempo, some slow it down. Some murder the Latin. All seem to treasure it as a marker of their identity.

The Latin words of the hymn may seem ancient enough but it wasn't the language in which it was first written in Alexandria, probably in the third century. That was Greek. Today we usually translate the Latin "sub tuum præsidum confugimus" as "to your patronage we fly". The words "præsidium" or "patronage" do not, however, really capture the sense of the original Greek which carried more of an evocation of refuge, protection, or indeed, mercy. Cardinal Walter Kasper makes this point in his excellent book *Mercy, the essence of the Gospel and the key to Christian life* – the book which may have inspired the Pope to call a jubilee year themed around mercy. In the prayer, as in ecclesiology more generally, Mary is an archetype of the maternal mercy of God in the way that the Church is called to share it. And no-one more in the Church than you and I, as Marists.

Even more ancient than the *Sub Tuum* are the second century words of Saint Irenæus, written in Lyon, the city from where the Marist project was later to emerge. He referred to Mary as the "undoer of knots", a title for her that grew into a popular devotion in parts of Europe and is today a favourite of Pope Francis. For a Church that is often criticised for tying the consciences of people into knots rather than releasing in them a sense of liberty and relief, it is a salutary image of what it should be. Freedom to captives, new sight to the blind, healing of the wounded, good news, the favour and grace of God – this is where and how mission of God is realised. This is where and how the Church shares in the mission of God.

Each Catholic school, as an expression of Church, has the challenge to translate into everyday ways of being and doing what it means to share authentically in this mission. It can be seen in the extent to which the school's culture is rooted these maternal ways of mercy. This is a challenge to which a Marist school should especially rise, in its presumption to shape its identity explicitly around the name of Mary. Tending hurts, opening eyes, providing refuge, creating a home, building resilience, engendering hope, freeing hearts – this is the mercy of God to which every ecclesial community is called to incarnate.

'What kind of expression of Church is our school?' is a question that Marist educators would do well to ask themselves from time to time. 'What does it mean for us to be Marian?'



## TIMORESE COMMUNITY OPENS NEW SCHOOL



Last month, a new Catholic primary school was opened in the remote mountain community of Abafala in Timor-Leste. More than 300 people attended the opening celebration, which took place on Friday, January 23. There were speeches and students performed traditional Timorese dances. Ceremonial ribbons were cut and the building was officially blessed.

School Principal Mistre Jaime and a spokesperson from the Ministry of Education both thanked Australian Marist donors and European agencies for their support and commented on the building's high standard of completion. There was an announcement that the Ministry of Education would provide the school new desks and chairs. Marist Solidarity in-country project manager Brother Tony Clark worked very closely with the community to rebuild the school. He said he was moved to see that the whole community was obviously proud of their school's high quality.

Marist Solidarity Timor-Leste projects' coordinator Mr Michael Coleman said that he felt privileged "to share this milestone with the local community, the young people of Abafala and, more broadly, Timor-Leste." He thanked the Diocese's Catholic Education Director, Madre Herminia Sarmento for her role in developing the school and builder Mr Martinus Rerebain for his high-quality work. The building includes three classrooms and toilets. It offers 135 young people access to primary education.

Michael said he was encouraged to see how the work our donors support had made a difference to the lives of young people and to the future of education in Timor-Leste.

He gave special thanks to Australian Marist schools Catholic College Sale, Galen Catholic College, Wangaratta and Notre Dame College, Shepparton for their support of this much-needed project.
