Dear Members of the Marist Family

"Why evangelise?"

It was a question put to Marist Principals last week in a deeply insightful presentation from Daniel Ang, one of our guest speakers at the Mittagong conference. And a fundamental question it is. Why do we do it, at all? Why devote all the energies and resources that we do to this pursuit?

Daniel's answer to his own question is in one way obvious, but it is also challenging. Indeed, it challenges us to our core: [Evangelisation] arises from the fundamental conviction that God alone fulfils the deepest requirements of the human person. Our Christian witness, proclamation, dialogue, and service is fired by the conviction that it is the encounter with Christ that promotes human flourishing, opens us to the deepest horizons of our own being and every other with whom we share creation and a common vocation in the life of God.

Earlier in the same session, another presenter, Dr Paul Monkerud, had reminded us of Greek etymology of "evangelisation" comprising two elements: "good" and "news". Father Paul proposed to us that we need both elements in our work. Indeed, there nothing so intrinsically good and no news that is more compelling.

Why then, does the Church have so much trouble selling it? Why, don't our students respond with unbridled passion and fervour? The goodness and attraction of the Gospel are somewhat compromised, of course, by would-be evangelisers such as us who do not always credibly or clearly radiate it, or who are not in situations where they can come close enough to young people to affect them deeply by what's in their own hearts. Brother Mark O'Connor made a key point in his presentation that in his experience the most effective evangelisers were those who were closest to those with whom they worked. This was powerfully amplified by the two young Remar gap students who spoke of the significance of people and programmes that had allowed them to be touched in their hearts, and through those encounters to meet Jesus.

Our Marist way, at its best, has us do just that: creating opportunities to affect young people in and through relationships with them, and particularly relationships and programmes that lead explicitly to a Christ-encounter.

An abiding challenge, though, is to keep the flame of the gospel burning in our own hearts. All of us live in the same Western cultural milieu that has prompted the last two Popes to call for a "new evangelisation": a milieu that has both fractured and muted the Christian meta-narrative. Without a culture that provides much scaffolding at all to Gospel living, we can slip into our own evangelical tepidity. Among the many benefits week's conference was what it offered our school leaders in re-kindling their own passion for the Gospel. It was a rich experience: the dialogue and thought, the prayer and worship, the conviviality and companionship. It lifted all who were there.

This week, we have the first "Footsteps II" programme at Mittagong, the biennial "Being Marist Conference" in Melbourne, and a Marist delegation travels to the RE Congress in Los Angeles. Like the Principals' Conference, they will be wonderful meetings of Marists. Next term's conference on 'Evangelisation of Youth, the Marist Way' will be the same, so too the annual Marist Pilgrimage that leaves for France at the end of the month. As will all the programmes, courses and conferences for the rest of 2012. We need them. They keep our fires burning; they keep God's fire burning in us. They are peal experiences that help to sustain our everyday lives and ministry. Our Marist story is indeed a wonderfully rich and evangelical one to enter, and our fellow Marists offer us a marvellous companionship for this gospel journey. They keep reminding us just why we do what we do, and they help us to do as well as it deserves to be done.

FOOTSTEPS 2 MITTAGONG

As usual the members of the Mission and Life Team have been busy assisting schools and their staffs in the ongoing formation in Marist Spirituality. The replacement programmes for Sharing Our Call/Sharing Champagnat's Visionnow called Footsteps and Footsteps 2 have now been run at Mittagong for the first time each. Twenty six participants and the complete team attended the Footsteps programme (4-7 March), which had been completely and thoroughly revised...everyone thought it a complete success. One Participant had this to say:

Thank you so much for all your generosity, hospitality and hard work in making this an inspirational program that helps all those involved to rise to the challenge to follow Marcellin's footsteps in becoming disciples (the face of Jesus) to others through Mary.

The Footsteps 2 (18-21 March) programme was similarly well accepted and proved to be a powerful and inspirational journey for all. Twenty one participants and five staff endured the vagaries of Mittagong's weather to see the days completed successfully. One valuable feature added to these new programmes is a Mass celebrated in the late afternoon of the Tuesday by Fr Gary Perritt OP.

Other programmes offered have been the Spirituality and Leadership 3 at Hamilton to a grouup of twenty or so Middle Managers and two short courses to staff at both Ashgrove and Mt Maria. The S&P 3 programme concentratted the challenges of post-modernism and understanding the Marisn face of the Church. The short courses consisted of input and discussion on the Eucharist, on Love of Work and on Prayer : each course was well attended, and considering that they are held either before school or after it, this says a great deal about the enthusiasm and sincerity of the people who take part. At the session on Prayer those of us old enough to remember actyualy sang a few verses of "I Never Promised You a Rose Garden"!! (The pleas of the younger ones to please stop ended the singing early).
