Dear Brothers, Colleagues and Friends

Do you have a patron saint?

It has been recently announced by Australian Catholic University that it has chosen three patron saints for different aspects of the professional work of the University. St Marcellin Champagnat has been named as Patron Saint of Students, Learning, and Teachers. As Marists, we would readily applaud this is a worthy choice. And we are collectively honoured by it.

"Students, Learning and Teachers". Yes, having those three as the objects of St Marcellin's patronage names something of the essence of the Founder's life project. I imagine that the choice of words, and also their order, was both considered and deliberate. "Learning" – an activity, a process, an outcome – is bookended by "students" and "teachers" – people. It implies that the dynamic of interpersonal relationships provides the framework for work of a school, that education is before all else about people.

St Marcellin knew this well, of course. He put it at the heart of the educational approach he taught to that first generation of Marists. "To educate young people, first we love them". First. He didn't mean this in some kind of theoretical, abstract way – like Charlie Brown's "I love humankind; it's just people I can't stand." No, for Marcellin, love was about genuine relationships. Love was both the means and the end of the schooling experience.

Lest we be tempted to think that such an approach suggests that Marcellin's focus was limited to the quality of relationships – what we extol in our Marist rhetoric as "family spirit", "simplicity", and relating as surrogate "brothers", "sisters", "fathers" and "mothers" – and not with the outcomes of the learning-teaching process, then we would be misrepresenting him. It is not possible to understand Marcellin without appreciating the centrality of the educational lens he brought to addressing the needs of young people. The liberating effects of a good education were pivotal for him. He put a strong emphasis on what happened in the classroom, on what we might call the craft of teaching, and on methods that resulted in effective learning. He was not shy, either, of challenging ineffective or tired methods used by some of his Brothers and insisting they seek out newer, more effective ones. The method for the teaching of reading was a case in point.

In a double honour for 2014, ACU is also soon to open a new multi-storey building on its North Sydney campus named in honour of St Marcellin. Its use will be entirely devoted to students, learning and teachers.

Names. Saints. Patrons. Mostly they are carefully chosen, even strategically so. The challenge, however, is for them to continue to mean something beyond the intention of their choosers, to have an ongoing and fruitful significance for people, not to be empty honorifics. Next week, all around Australia our Marist schools and the Church more widely will be celebrating a name, a saint, a patron. 6th June, the Feast of St Marcellin. In the Church's general liturgical calendar it is categorised as an "Optional Memorial", but for Marist communities it has the rank of a "Solemnity". Something that must be celebrated. In giving it this status, the wider Church is reminding us Marists that the name of our patron saint is not to be merely a badge, a brand, an identifying label for us. Marcellin is our model of Christian discipleship, someone whose spiritual and apostolic inheritance we have received, and to which we are called to be creatively faithful in seeking to make, like him, Jesus Christ known and loved through the Christian education of young people.


