Dear Brothers, Colleagues and Friends

It's been a sad kind of a month, or at least I have found it so.

First, MH17, of course – just a brutal and gutting thing. Then, the cheap, cavalier taking of life in the apparently stagnated and unforgiving blow-trading between Israel and Hamas – what a tale of horror that has become. It's all so tragically ironic that it occurs in the year we mark the centenary of a similarly clueless, costly slog in the muddy trenches of Belgium and northern France. Never again, the world promised itself. Ugh! And it goes on: the other plane crashes of recent weeks; the going slaughter caused by rival warlords and sect leaders in Syria and elsewhere; the disturbingly inhumane and arrogant treatment of people who are seeking asylum in our country; and other matters of sadness and shame closer to home. It can all be a more than a little disheartening.

So often, it's young people who are the ones who wear all this, and that exacerbates the tragedy for people such as you and me who have dedicated our lives to the education and well-being of young people, who have a heart for the young and a deep belief in their goodness and potential. Sad, sad, sad.

In naming who we are as Marists and what we are about with young people, the late Brother Charles Howard liked to describe us as "sowers of hope". It is well for us never to lose our sense of the importance and the centrality of that as a job descriptor. Certainly, the soil in which we do that sowing can be, to use the gospel image, a little rocky at times. If normal adolescent angst and autonomy don't provide sufficient rockiness on their own, the soil is made all the more unreceptive to our seed-planting by the post-modern, relativist and secularist field in which it finds itself. To that, mix in the harm and betrayal inflicted by big people with tiny consciences, and young people's capacity for trust and their sense of the world as a good place diminish alarmingly.

Our response? It is as it always has been: education. That was Marcellin's basic intuition. That is our particular contribution to all that conspires to shrink young people's readiness to grow in faith, hope and love. For us as Marists, it is an education that primarily uses the twin means of *presence* and *good example*; we affect young people by who we are in their lives. One essential ingredient of that example must be joy; not a happy-clappy, shallow bounciness, but a deep, inner Marian joy. In his biography of St Marcellin, Brother Jean-Bapiste lists "joy" as the first Marist quality that we should imitate from the Founder.

To cultivate such joy in ourselves, we would do well to heed the advice of Frederic Ozanam, the founder of the St Vincent de Paul Society, who urged people "to beware of discouragement" because "it is the death of the soul". Marcellin, who also greatly admired Vincent de Paul, said similar things. He believed that discouragement was the single most harmful trap that lurked for young people, a "work of the devil". He therefore urged his Brothers always to be encouragers. For us to be that for young people, we need ourselves to avoid feeding or wallowing in the discouragement that may well up in our own hearts. It doesn't mean we should insulate ourselves from feelings of hurt and injustice, but it does mean that we should never be mastered by them. It is, at the end of the day, to live the spirit of Mary's *Magnificat*.



St Benedict's School, Broadway a history of a Catholic school 1838-2012 Kelvin Canavan



Take a walk down memory lane...

Kelvin Canavan's account of the story of St Benedict's School from 1838 to 2012 gives readers a concise overview of Catholic schooling in Sydney. He uses St Benedict's to tell a fascinating story.

He describes the early years when former convicts and assisted immigrants taught large classes in the chapel-school, and the circumstances that saw the parish turn to the Sisters of the Good Samaritan and the Marist Brothers.

The reader is given a snapshot of changing custom and practice in schooling and is introduced to some facinating characters associated with St Benedict's.

Kelvin Canavan is a Marist Brother and was a long-term Executive Director of Schools in the Archdiocese of Sydney. Over the past thirty years Kelvin has written about the Catholic school story and supported others in their research and historical writing.
