### From Dr Frank Malloy

Dear Colleagues

Since the announcement of a proposed new school-funding model by Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull and Education Minister Simon Birmingham on Tuesday May 2nd 2017, there has been enormous uncertainty among Catholic leaders, school principals and families. Judging by letters to editors in our major newspapers and other media commentary, Catholics need be careful to not exude a sense of "entitlement" in regard to government funding for our schools. We should never take government funding for granted and must constantly affirm our major political parties in their support for parents to choose a Catholic education for their children.

All Australians would agree with the noble aims of the proposed new funding model – transparent, according to need, and fair for all sectors, schools and families. However devising a fair formula, acceptable to all, that accurately identifies need, is an enormous and complex challenge. The proposed new funding formula does disadvantage Catholic schools across the country, schools which now educate over 20% of the nation's children. This is not Catholic "propaganda". It is a statement based on careful research directly linked to the inadequacies of calculating a school's families collective "capacity to contribute" financially to the education of the children, based on a formula referred to as a school Socio-Economic Status (SES) score.

In 2011, the report titled Review of Funding for Schooling¹ now known as "Gonski 1.0" recommended:

that school SES scores be used only in the short term, with the Government advised to "commence work as a priority to develop, trial and implement a better measure of the capacity of parents to contribute in consultation with the non-government sectors."

In February 2017, the Victorian Catholic Education Commission published an informative piece of research titled "Capacity to contribute and school SES scores." This paper also identifies the inadequacies of the SES formula, which underpins the proposed new funding model. Some key points from that research include:

- Through the use of school SES scores, capacity to contribute is not currently measured in a way that accurately reflects school need. Worse, the various flaws in the way SES scores measure capacity to contribute make them biased in favour of high-income and affluent families.
- This is contrary to the premise of the Schooling Resource Standard (SRS) funding model. A funding model that purports
  to be needs based is, in fact, corrupted by school SES scores and ultimately favours the least-needy non-government
  schools.
- There is, therefore, a need to develop a new measure of capacity to contribute in the SRS model. Notably, the Review
  of Funding for Schooling also recommended that the Australian Government develop, trial and implement a new
  measure of capacity to contribute as soon as possible.
- In simple terms, a new measure must:
  - Better measure financial means (incomes and wealth) than SES scores
  - More accurately reflect the circumstances of each individual student than SES scores
  - Be more up-to-date than SES scores.

A key message from all Marist Schools to our elected Members of Parliament is for the Government to review the proposed new funding model in 2017 in line with the recommendation of the Gonski Review. To allow time for this review to be properly conducted and findings included in the proposed new model will necessitate current arrangements remaining in place for 2018, and the new model commencing in 2019.

Two great heroes for Australian Marists are Saint Marcellin and Saint Mary MacKillop of the Cross. Both were skilled advocates when dealing with Church and civil authorities. Let us seek their intercessions as we pray for the best educational outcomes for young Australians in every school across the land.


