Dear Brothers, Colleagues and Friends

There is something that needs to be expunged from our Marist lexicon. In fact, let's list it on the Syllabus of Errors, if such a thing still exists. The word is just wrong. Actually, I could say it five times: wrong, wrong, wrong, wrong, wrong. Those who know me well would attest to my quickly morphing from an otherwise calm and reserved Little Brother of Mary to a screaming lunatic at the mention of the term.

I'll put it in little type to minimise the heresy: pillars. It is difficult to source why and when this misappropriation happened of Chapter 5 of the document *In the Footsteps of Marcellin Champagnat, A Vision for Marist Education Today*. You know it: the chapter that describes five characteristic traits of a Marist ministerial style. But it did. To me it is always an annoying misinterpretation, a misleading skewing, and an unfortunate demeaning of what was a landmark Marist reference text.

There is no mention of the p-word in the chapter. Not one. Indeed, it doesn't even quietly imply that there is anything foundational or essential about the five characteristics it describes. Those who are aware of other Marist texts would know that authors have come up with other ways of describing a distinctive Marist style: a French publication on Marist education names eight characteristics; a Brazilian one chooses twelve; a Spanish text has a whole chart of traits, sub-traits, and complex links among them; Marcellin thought there were just three. All are valid.

But all are only descriptive, figurative, a way of trying to capture the expressing of something which is more fundamental. They offer ways of encapsulating what Marists see as characteristic of their way of doing evangelisation through education, of sowing seeds of gospel hope with young people. The characteristics do not name the essence of Marist education; that happens in the previous chapter. And they are certainly not the foundation stones on which that essence rests. Another Marist reference document gets much closer to that – *Water from the Rock* \neg - in its attempt to unpack Marist spirituality (which it does by naming six elements).

Three, five, six, twelve – the numbers are a little beside the point. The thing that is important is the WHAT of the essence, the source, the basis. And that's a Marist's personal experience both of the love of God and love of young people in need. It is a love that comes from and leads to God. That's what is foundational to Marist education. If whatever words we use to describe how that is expressed only reflect a cultural style then, as St Paul tells us, our efforts will be little more than a clanging bell, an empty gong.

This week culminates with the Feast of St Marcellin – which Australian Marist schools always celebrate liturgically and socially in grand style. And that's great. I'll have the opportunity to join two schools for their Masses later this week, and I look forward to it. But style is not on what we build. St Marcellin would gently remind us of the first two words of Psalm 127:

Nisi Dominus

Syrian Marists Give Testimonies in Video Message for Feast of St Marcellin

The Superior General is challenging Marists to leave their comfort zone using testimonies of Syrians in his <u>VIDEO MESSAGE</u> for the feast of the Institute's founder on June 6.

Brother Emili Turú interviewed three Syrian brothers on tape during his trip to Lebanon, where the Marist European Conference took place from May 10 - 14, with the hope of encouraging Marists to "take risks." The video includes testimonies of bothers Georges Hakim, Georges Sabe and Bahjat Azrié, who travelled from Aleppo to Beirut, and speak of their work and the current situation in the war torn country. It also includes testimonies of two young female volunteers, a Christian and a Muslim, who speak of their work with the Marists in Syria. Brother Emili released his first video message for the feast of St Marcellin last year to mark the start of the three-year preparation for the Institute's bicentenary in 2017.

In this year's message, Br Emili also expresses gratitude and support to Marists who are in dangerous or difficult situations worldwide.
