Dear Brothers, Colleagues and Friends

What prompted some educational bureaucrat to come up with the idea that "cohort" would be appropriate as a collective noun for students? A gaggle of geese, that's good. A stand of trees, that works. A parliament of owls, that's interesting. A synod bishops, perhaps. But a cohort of students?

The Romans had cohorts. They marched in military formation, along straight roads, followed orders without question, and uncritically implemented how-to-win-battles manuals that others had written for them. They had great success as long as non-questioning discipline was maintained.

Since I first came across the term used to describe a group of students some years ago, I have been careful to avoid it. I've waged my own private campaign of non-violent disobedience, surreptitiously removing it from reports and articles written by others. "Our Year 12 cohort", "We have a big cohort next year", "We expect strong results from this cohort" – these have all been quietly censored. I don't feel that I've been especially effective in influencing systemic change, but I take some comfort in striking a personal blow for humaneness.

A school, it seems to me, works best when it strives to be a humane place. Humane in its scale, in its systems, in its communications, in its policies, in its physical environment, in its ways of relating, and in its priorities. Factors that work for humaneness are beauty, gentleness, respect, cordiality, sensitivity, creativity, and compassion.

As we know well, our Founder preferred a term for schools that was quite different from "cohort". He intuited that "family" would be the best metaphor to use for what a good school aspired to be. For St Marcellin, the education of young people pivoted on the quality of inter-personal relationships between a teacher and student – relationships that were transparent, healthy, freeing, hope-filled and, above all, loving. Admittedly it wasn't original – he pinched the "family spirit" idea from St Francis de Sales – but it certainly was quite counter-cultural. Schools typically were not like that at the time. They could be cruel and teachers could be capricious. The so-called "mutual method" of instruction that was being promoted by many gave priority to order, efficiency, outcomes, and military-style discipline. Marcellin's priorities were sourced elsewhere.

Families can be messy and imperfect, but at their best they are inclusive, person-focussed, resilient, forgiving, and founded on an inherent belief in the goodness of each member. While we always need to be judicious in using family as the metaphor for schools – and not allowing it to become an excuse for poor protocols or imprudent judgements – it does provide us with a rich image on which to imagine what a school community can be.

As we celebrate the upcoming feast day of St Marcellin, let us re-commit ourselves to building communities where each of us feels welcomed and accepted, where students are safe and can pursue their hopes with confidence and encouragement, and where all can become the individuals God wants them to be.
