Dear Brothers, Colleagues and Friends

You would need to be of a certain age to recall *Number 96*, the controversial but popular soapie that jolted a somnolent Australia into confronting a number of social questions, as well as reportedly saving Channel Ten from the liquidators, back in the first half of the 1970s. The nudity helped. But so did the sharp satire. Among the diverse characters thrown together in one apartment building – and one who kept her clothes on, thankfully – was Dorrie Evans. Dorrie was the busybody, gossipy know-all, and a character quite cleverly constructed by the show's writers. She provided something of a personification of a self-righteous, narrow-minded and anachronistic strand in Australian awareness and sensibility. One of the techniques that the script-writers used for Dorrie was her malapropisms.

Some of her gems: "Pardon me for protruding, but"; "I prefer to remain ambiguous"; "That is a horse of an entirely different colour"; "We've passed a lot of water under the bridge"; "Life is not always a bowl of cherubs"; "It's enough to drive a body beresk".

Dorrie was well-enough intentioned but she was both blinkered and prejudiced. The tenacity with which she held her opinions tended to be inversely proportional to the depth of her knowledge and the subtleness of her understanding. One or two populist politicians spring to mind for the same reason. Dorrie's recurring lines — "It is a well-known fact", "Why wasn't I told?" and "I am quite ardamant about that" — turned on the irony of her being condemned from her own mouth. Again, it is difficult not to think of some members of the political class.

We can thank Sheridan's "Mrs Malaprop" in *The Rivals* for the term, of course, but dramatists have been alert to the effectiveness of the technique of malapropism for centuries. Think of Shakespeare's Constable Dogberry in *Much Ado About Nothing* or Mistress Quickly, Falstaff's foil in three plays. The Two Ronnies used it to great comic effect. More recently, the script-writers of *Kath and Kim* brought fresh wit to it:

Kim: I want to be effluent, Mum, effluent!

Kath: But you are effluent, Kim!

What is at play here is not simply smart scripting. Its effect is sourced in the sad truth that poor mastery of language is often reflective of a poor mastery of concepts and ideas. It frequently exposes ignorance, insularity and foreclosed thought. A person who purports to be sensible, intelligent and full of common sense uses words and expressions that prove him or her to be just the opposite.

Who can save the country being overrun by Dorries? Or even their being elected to government? Teachers, of course. And schools that foster critical thinking, informed dialogue, breadth of awareness, practised articulation of ideas, inclusive cultures, and empathetic engagement in the questions of the day.

But you don't need to have extra-century perception to know that, for all intensive purposes, there is always likely to be a suppository of Dorrie-ism that needs to be distinguished. Particularly at election time when it's déjà vu all over again.



MARIST SOLIDARITY HOSTS INDIA EXHIBITION IN BRISBANE



Last Thursday night, more than 70 people gathered at the Marist Centre Brisbane to discover the work of the Marist Brothers in India at a photographic exhibition called *Eyes on India*.

The Marist Brothers have worked in India, making education more accessible for very poor, socially-ostracised communities, for more than four decades.

Last year, acclaimed photographer and former student of St Francis Xavier's College Hamilton, <u>Conor Ashleigh</u> visited four of these communities on behalf of Marist Solidarity and captured some outstanding images—a selection of which were featured at the exhibition.

Featured projects included: <u>St Marcellin Higher Secondary School</u> at **Mangamanuthu**; <u>Marist Nursery and Primary School</u> at **Vizhalanmedu; and <u>Marist Primary and Secondary School</u>** in the rural village of **P.Udayapatti**.

The Marist Brothers' HIV/AIDS outreach program in **Trichy**, Operation Rainbow, was also featured.

Guests were welcomed by Marist Solidarity Chair, Peter Sheehan and CEO, Brother Allen Sherry reflected on his experiences in India, where he first visited more than 30 years ago.

The night also marked the launch of the <u>2016 End of Financial Year Appeal</u>, to support the Brothers' ongoing work to improve education outcomes in India.

We are grateful for the many people who supported our work, by attending the exhibition, and engaging in our stories of change in India.

The *Eyes on India* exhibition will be held at the Marist Centre Melbourne on August 21.



WORLD YOUTH DAY 2016



World Youth Day is fast approaching, and 15 Young Marists are eagerly anticipating their departure! Led by Sally McEniry, Ryan Gato & Br Neville Solomon, the pilgrimage will depart from Sydney on July 12th. Beginning in Paris, the "Marist Way to World Youth Day" pilgrimage will explore the many gems of Paris, as well as experience the French holiday and celebration of Bastille Day.

Heading south the group will then

travel to Lyon, where they will base themselves for the following ten days. With time in Lyon as well as a trip out to Le Puy, the group will explore the beauty of the French countryside and some of the significant Marist sites. July 17 is the date that the International Meeting of Young Marists kicks off, and the Australian group will join with approximately 400 other Young Marists from all four branches of the Marist family. This weeklong engagement is titled "Dare to Dream", and will lead participants on a journey into the heart of Marist spirituality, particularly focusing on the bicentenary of the Fourviére pledge. After pondering and celebrating the beginnings of our Marist family, the pilgrimage will continue on to Krakow, Poland. Krakow will be flooded with millions of young Catholic pilgrims, who have journeyed from near and far to celebrate the 13th International World Youth Day.

WYD is a weeklong celebration and include: an opening Papal welcome Catechesis sessions, an Australian gathering, Pilgrimage Campus Misericordiae, the Mass. With somewhere between 2-2.5 million pilgrims expected



attend the final Papal Mass, WYD is set to be an amazing experience for our Australian Marist group.
