Dear Colleagues,

Late last term it was announced **Mr Wayne Marshall**, currently the Principal at John Therry Catholic College, Rosemeadow has been appointed as the new Principal of St John the Evangelist Catholic High School, Nowra, commencing in 2023. We extend our sincere congratulations to Wayne on this appointment. Wayne commenced his teaching career in the Archdiocese of Sydney at the renowned Benedict Senior College Auburn, which was established by the Marist Brothers in 1942. He soon assumed senior leadership roles, including Assistant Principalship in three Sydney schools from 1997. For a number of years Wayne also provided vital leadership at a system level in



Sydney, in the development and efficacy of Pastoral Coordinators across 10 secondary schools in the Inner Western Region of the Archdiocese. In 2012, Wayne was appointed Principal at Mount Carmel Catholic College, Varroville, and in 2018 assumed the Principalship of John Therry Catholic College, Rosemeadow. Wayne's leadership of these Marist schools over the last decade has been outstanding. Born of his own rich personal faith, Wayne's leadership is characterised by a deep connection to each community, practical common sense and commitment to improved learning outcomes for all students. Not only has Wayne contributed to Marist life through his distinguished leadership of two Marist schools, but through his close relationships with Marists across the country and overseas, his insightful encouragement of the growth of the Marist Association, and his generous support of Marist ministries. Wayne's genuine commitment to the enlivening of Marist life and spirituality is evident to all, most especially through his own example and commitment to the good of others. We wish Wayne every success in his new role, happiness in the next stage of his life and the assurance of the prayers, connection and support of our Marist family into the future.

With the final term commencing for 2022, Year 12 students across the country are in their final weeks of school life and facing the challenges of their final examinations. This cohort was in Year 10 when the Covid 19 pandemic emerged in early March 2020. They have endured significant disruption in these final three years and one can only admire their collective resilience in persevering with such constancy throughout this time. Teachers and Principals are consistent in their admiration for the class of 2022. They speak of their support for one another, their maturity, their understated strength of character, and their faith. Let us all keep these young people in our prayers as they make the transition from school over these coming months, asking God to help them reflect with gratitude and satisfaction for all they have achieved as school students over the past 13 years.

In the next 6 weeks, all three Regions will host their annual Marist Schools Australia Mass and Dinner. These will occur at Saint Joseph's College Hunters Hill in Sydney, Marist College Ashgrove in Brisbane, and Marcellin College Bulleen in Melbourne. Like so many other gatherings, this important one has been unable to occur in 2020 and 2021 due to the pandemic. The major features of each evening are the celebration of the Eucharist and the *Appreciation Awards*, which honour those who have made remarkable contributions to Marist education and have been nominated by their school and MSA. We look forward to sharing in these important celebrations.

Marist Schools Australia Board Report

On Wednesday 12th October the Marist Schools Australia Board met for their penultimate gathering for 2022. The Directors have been constant in their dedication and diligence during this first year of the new Company. Among the items discussed was the recent Australian Bishops Guidelines for Catholic Schools on identity and gender titled "Created and Loved". The Chair of the Board Professor Brother David Hall FMS, who was involved in draft iterations of the document commented,



"These guidelines are a most welcome resource for Catholic schools throughout Australia. May they continue to help shape our schools as places renowned for respect, social acceptance, and inclusion."

Also presented and approved were the budgets for MSA's operations which include Formation and Youth Ministry. The 2023 Formation and Youth Ministry Programmes were also highlighted and endorsed as was the strong support from our Diocesan partners in this vital work with the staff and students in our schools.

A series of policy amendments were also approved considering recent changes by the regulators in Victoria. The work done in this regard by MSA's *Head of Governance, Legal and Risk,* Ms Elizabeth Gallagher was affirmed with appreciation. Board Director Ms Libby Denny, Chair of the Professional Standards Committee of the Board commented,

"The importance of the work being done in Victoria cannot be underestimated as we seek to work as a society that prioritises an unfailing commitment to the safety, education, and development of our children."



Australian College of Educational Leaders National Awards Ceremony



Marists educating the 'poorest of the poor' in India

Over 20% of India's 1.3 billion people live in poverty, and less than 4 of 10 children progress beyond three years schooling. Since 1974, the Marist Brothers have worked in India to help the most marginalised children break the cycle of poverty through education. In 2003, the Brothers established the Marcellin Trust for social and humanitarian work in India. With your support, AMS partners with India's Marist communities to create hope for vulnerable children and their families.

Chetana Tribal Boys Hostel

in West Bengal, Eastern India allows the 'poorest of the poor' to attend local schools. Parish Priests and other religious staff refer highly marginalised boys to the Hostel for accommodation, food, and education support. Local Priests, Sisters, and Brothers provide ongoing pastoral support to the boys and their families.

At the request of students, the Hostel has recently introduced extra tuition at the Hostel, to supplement their local schooling. Through AMS, basic furniture, laptops, projectors, and books are

now available for tutoring, and for teacher and parent meetings. The Chetana boys have joined online get-togethers with Marist College Canberra students, an experience appreciated by both cohorts.

With support from AMS, the Brothers have used Hostel facilities, while the boys are at school, to provide vocational tailoring skills and sewing machines to impoverished girls and young women. The skills gained have led to self-employment and other work opportunities.

Student outcomes. In May 2022, Brother Jili, Project Coordinator told us about current student progress and graduate outcomes. Five graduates are now in various seminaries, and around 20 attend university. It's noteworthy too that with the extra tutoring support, some boys are now topping the class at their local school.

The Brothers recently identified further urgent community needs, and with AMS assistance, will provide a year's Family Food and Education Support to 100 families in the Santhal community. Basic food and essentials packages ('Parcels of Joy') reach 400 vulnerable children and parents.

The Future

With support from donors, the Marist Brothers aim to build a two-classroom community centre to extend educational and vocational opportunities. The classrooms will enable vocational tailoring skills for women and girls, as well as five classes a week in reading, writing, computers and spoken English. An additional 50 girls and 30 boys will benefit from the classes.

For almost 20 years, AMS has joined India's Marist community to help extremely disadvantaged young people and their families to live with hope and dignity. AMS gratefully acknowledges the generous fundraising from Marist schools across Australia who enable these life-changing services. Your further support will help us to continue to transform the lives of vulnerable young people throughout our region.
