Dear Members of the Marist family

The response of our fellow Marists in Syria to the crumbling situation in which they find themselves has touched the Marist world, not least here among the family of Australian Marist schools. As we go to press today, Brother Georges Sabé together with his two confreres and more than fifty other Marist volunteers – calling themselves the "Blue Marists" after the epithet given to Marcellin's Brothers by the people of Saint-Chamond – are doing what they can to give hope and help to the families of Aleppo. The photos and written accounts of their work (see them on www.champagnat.org) are moving and inspirational.

But they are ordinary people. Like us. And they are working with ordinary youngsters. Like we do. Until very recently they were running an ordinary school. Like ours are. It's their circumstances that have become extraordinary. They could have responded in a number of ways to that turn of events. They could have kept low. They could have left and returned when things were more secure. They could have waited to see how things might unfold before taking any big initiatives. The response they are choosing is one that Marcellin would have intuitively chosen: without hesitation to do everything they can to offer practical love to people, to sustain their faith and bolster their hope, to give them a vision for something better. To do it in simple and direct ways. To do it with humour and grace. To gather others around them. To entrust it to God.

A couple of years after Marcellin's death, one of his fellow priests who had known him since seminary days wrote in a letter, "God chose him and said to him, 'Champagnat, do this' and Champagnat did it." Simple. Just like Mary's saying, "Let it happen to me as you have said." Fiat! It's being open to what God wants, and saying "Yes, it's up to me to do make that happen. God wants me to do this." That's the Marist way, Mary's way, Marcellin's way.

The locals in Aleppo apparently have a name for the area where the Marists have taken over three schools as refuge centres. They call it the Hill of Our Lady. Mary's hill. For it is indeed Mary's work that they do: standing with, gathering, loving, encouraging, nurturing, being resilient, sowing seeds of hope. "Bringing Christ life to birth", our Marist spirituality document Water from the Rock calls it.

Next week representatives from all over the country will gather at Mittagong for the first "Mission Assembly" of Marist Australia. Many will come from our schools; others from the range of other ministries and communities of the new Australian Province. It will be a world away from Aleppo, but in another sense we will be quite close to our fellow Marists there because we will be looking to the same God and seeking to be open to the same will. Like Mary, like Marcellin, we will be looking to see what God wants of us, and to say yes to that.

HOPE CONTINUES TO GROW IN BOUGAINVILLE

Br Marty Connell (Liason for MAPS projects across Melanesia) has recently returned from a monitoring visit to MAPS sponsored Project Sankamap on the Island of Bougainville. He reports that the project team consisting Eugene, Lucy and David have been busy conducting short-term programs and courses to improve the teaching skills of young teachers in village-based elementary schools across the island.

Their efforts have been supported by the local Catholic Education Office and Horizont3000 (an Austrian NGO working in the area of educational development). The project team hopes that these young teachers are able to develop the necessary skills and confidence they need to become regular government employed teachers.

In addition to their work among the island's emerging teachers, the project team have also been involved with running events and activities for the youth of the local Tunuru parish. Over three hundred young people recently attended a week-long program during their school holidays, which was designed to teach skills around self-resilience and personal goal setting.
